The Building Committee works in partnership with the Church Administrator to create a budget for the ongoing maintenance of the church building and of Summit House. Although the Church Administrator signs vendor contracts, the Building Committee researches improvements and large contractual commitments and takes them to the Board for approval.

Over fiscal year 2023-2024, the Building Committee oversaw the following projects:

Replaced footers on the fire escape.

Replace footers and decking and ramps on Summit House porch.

Fixed attic door on exterior of Summit as well as small repairs to gutters.

Replace walkways outside Social Hall doors with crushed gravel to amend the heaving slate that was a tripping hazard.

Reviewed contractual agreements for pest control and gutter cleaning and extended them to Summit House.

Partnered with Ministry for Earth to review solar panel efficiency, electrical use efficiency (refrigerators turned up, hot water heaters turned down, air conditioning questioned, etc). Edgewood Lane parking lot lights are scheduled for replacement on May 7th by Robertson Electrical Company.

Winterizing boiler room with volunteers.

Breaker Panels rewired professionally.

Basement flooding-further research on gutters to the street & foundation questions.

Group/Committee Overview:

2023-2024 Accomplishments:

Food Pantry

The Food Pantry has 25 volunteers who distribute food received from the Food Bank each first Friday of the month. We spent on the average \$140 a month for 1200 lbs. of food.

Each month we distributed food from the Food Bank as well as fresh vegetables from Whole Foods and purchased cleaning and personal care products. We served an average of 90 individuals from 24 families. Half of our individuals served were children. We purchased 50 gift cards worth \$25 each. We provided gift cards to Food Pantry clients in lieu of turkeys in November. We also provide our ministers with gift cards for church members in need. These are distributed at Thanksgiving and Christmas and throughout the year. We purchased a freezer and two ice chests to store our frozen foods and repurposed the closet in Summit 3 to store our food, properly labeled with USDA and last in/first out. - Mulch has been delivered for the RE playground.
- A table, bench, and bench with a back has been placed in an open mulched area by Wayside Place for meetings and enjoyment.
- Renewed mowing with Jack's Lawncare.
- The garden and flower boxes have been cleared and restarted with new food and flowers. Especially VA. native flowers and plants by our very own Walter Hoffman. Please enjoy the beautiful flowers. Walter created two Christmas fern gardens. One is with the butterfly garden area and the other is contained within the plastic chain fence at the Labyrinth.
- Our Wren has returned to a new Wren house and that is exciting.
- We have cleaned around and re-mulched around the native bushes and plants we planted last year.
- We are currently in maintenance mode from the prior years' work and really need help to weed these areas so they are not overtaken again.

Labyrinth Ministry

Labyrinth Ministry members: Rev Leia Durland Jones, Patty Wallens, and a number of congregants and community members who gather for specific events.

The Labyrinth Ministry offers opportunities to the UUCville Congregation and the larger community to experience the spiritual practice of walking the labyrinth, either on one of our 4 physical labyrinths or by "walking" with a finger on a finger labyrinth.

We have offered a number of opportunities this year. On New Year's Eve, we held an open walk after the Sunday worship service, and about 35 people of all ages walked the outdoor labyrinth. There was a table offering slips of paper to write down hopes/dreams/affirmations for the coming year (these were tied on a wreath which is in the Parlor for the year) and to write down what needs to be released from this year (these were burned in a home wood stove). On February 23-24, we were able to offer the Women's Dream Quest once again in person at church, facilitated by Judith Tripp, and organized by the Dream Quest Planning Circle, with 45 women attending. We were able to open the large Chartres-design canvas labyrinth in the Social Hall, and this was the focal point for the retreat, walked many times throughout the retreat. The small 3 circuit labyrinth was brought to DC by Rev Leia Durland-Jones on April 22 to be used in the ritual burial of an Earth Treasures jar, which was part of the Dream Quest retreat and will join other buried Earth Treasures jars, forming a global mandala of peace. The versatile labyrinth was loaned to the First Baptist Church in Waynesboro for use in their Good Friday and Easter ritual. We are planning to participate in World Labyrinth Day on May 4 by holding a walk on the outdoor labyrinth from 1-2 pm, in solidarity with labyrinth walkers around the world.

Ministry for Earth

Co-leaders: Kim Grover and Ellie Syverud

After a hiatus of several years and under the leadership and guidance of Rev Tim, a re-energized group came together in June 2023 under the name Ministry for Earth. We have organized ourselves into four areas: Education, Advocacy, Building/Grounds, and Public Service.

These are the actions we have accomplished this church year:

- Writing and distributing a newsletter ("The Green Scene") which covers a different sustainable topic each month. Starting in February 2024, we covered Sustainable Eating, Gardening, and Positive Climate News. The newsletter is co-written by Ellie Syverud and Johanna Woodchild.
- Hosting several Sustainable Eating (SE) Potluck meals to encourage members to eat more sustainably. We asked members to bring their recipes so that we can learn from each other. Thanks to Barb Alag, we produced an online cookbook that we will continue to revise as members offer new dishes. In addition, we put together a Sustainable Eating Cookbook Library for members to take and use. The group that organized the potlucks included Beverly Ryan, Ann Salamini, Donna Redmond, Kim Grover, Ellie Syverud, Angela Orebaugh.
- In addition to the potlucks, we held a series of three Vegan Cooking classes led by local restaurateur Ryan Beckland. A dozen of our members learned how to make several vegan dishes as well as learned some very useful tips.
- We offered a Green Table once/month with a large selection of information to help people live more sustainably. Our most reliable table rep has been Kate Fraleigh.

- We organized several community work days in collaboration with local environmental groups (Rivanna Conservation Alliance, Ivy Creek Natural Area) to help clean up our waterways and hiking paths and remove invasive species.
- We initiated some sustainable actions in and around our church campus, including switching to organic fair-trade coffee, and are investigating several other actions (hot water heating lowered, community solar, more efficient use of refrigerators, reusable/compostable cups) that will help reduce our carbon footprint. David Judd has been tireless in his efforts in this area.
- As a congregation, we have joined Virginia Interfaith Power and Light VAIPL is the state affiliate of a national organization, Interfaith Power & Light, which is dedicated to bringing together all faith communities to mobilize a religious response to climate change through energy conservation, energy efficiency, and renewable energy.
- We organized a Magazine Exchange for people to recycle their reading materials and borrow rather than buy new ones.
- Provided several opportunities for members to engage in legislative advocacy through petitions, letters, and emails.
- Co-led with Rev Susan (subbing for Rev Tim), our annual Earth Day Service.

Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee met via zoom, with seven meetings between September and April. Initially, the open leadership positions included: Board Vice President and Secretary, two Member atlarge Board positions, one Personnel Committee member, and four Nominating Committee members. The Vice president, one at-large Board member, and three members of the Nominating Committee agreed to serve additional terms. This left open the positions of Board Secretary, one Member-at large, one member of Personnel Committee, and an optional member of the Nominating Committee which we decided to fill.

A major focus of the committee has been to recruit leaders who are representative and inclusive of the larger congregation, with a diversity of new and longer-term members representing different age ranges, those of different gender and culture, and members with families engaged in RE programs as well as those of single or other households. The committee will continue to work toward increasing inclusion in the Nominating Committee and UUCC leadership as a whole.

This year's Nominating Committee considered persons who had been recommended by the ministers and contacted previously, newly interested persons, and searched for additional candidates. The committee used email, phone, and in-person conversations to talk with potential candidates, providing information, and soliciting further interest. Rev Tim also spoke with two potential candidates.

In April, the committee will prepare a slate of candidates, to be reviewed by ministers and submitted for congregational voting at the annual meeting on June 9th. Each nominee will be asked to submit a short description of their interest in serving as well as their experiences and service in UU congregations. Next year the committee chair will be determined by the Nominating Committee once members are approved by the congregation.

We hosted the Men of Pacem from November 11 to November 24th. Other congregations served them dinner and provided welcome as overnight guests in Summit House, while we made sure they had full use of the kitchen. From November 25 to December 8th, we hosted the women of PACEM and with the help of the Islamic Society, Mandy's VFW Ladies and Ebenezer Baptist Church we fed them during the week

of November 25th. We had work crews who set up Summit House with cots and facilitated the changeover from Men to Women and clean up. We reached capacity of 40 men on several nights and our women guests averaged between 9 and 14 guests.

The Pastoral Care Team continued to provide support to congregants through in person visits, zoom, phone calls, emails and/or texts.

Pastoral Visitors meet monthly with Rev Tim Temerson to discuss congregant contacts, to support each other and to provide ongoing education regarding topics relevant to our work. Our monthly meetings offer Pastoral Visitors an opportunity to share what is going on in their personal lives as well as talking about their congregant contacts. In addition to supporting each other this time is used to problem-solve some of the challenges that arise in our work.

Shirley Paul continues to send bereavement cards on behalf of the congregation.

Rev Tim asked us to consider increasing our physical presence on Sundays by having a member of our team stand by the bowl as members of the congregation come forward to put pebbles representing their joys or sorrows in the water. Then, following the service that same pastoral visitor is available in the back of the sanctuary for 15 minutes to be present with anyone who may have a concern to share or simply wants a compassionate listening ear.

Nearly everyone on the team has rotated into this role each Sunday. This practice seems to be well received and has been an honor for each of us as a way of being present. We average about one person every other week stopping by to talk with the team member who remains after the service. We have gotten positive feedback from congregants about our presence during the services.

We recreated an introduction card to give to our congregants that spells out our role and boundaries including that what is shared with your pastoral visitor may be shared with the team, but no further, to help us support each other and our congregants. In addition, this makes it easier for another team member to fill in if one of us is unable to be in touch for a while due to travel or medical needs. The card also states how to reach us.

Committee Overview: This committee reviews personnel needs, roles, job descriptions, policies and compensation packages related to the congregation's paid staff. When appropriate, the committee makes recommendations to the Lead Minister or the Board of Trustees regarding these items. This committee is also tasked with facilitating the annual performance evaluation process at UUCville Committee Accomplishments 2023-2024:

- Performance evaluations We are in the process of ensuring completion of short form
 evaluations for the following staff: Scott DeVeaux (completed), Sean Skally, Caroline Heins and
 Carole McIvor. Rev. Leia Durland-Jones is currently on sabbatical and won't receive a review at
 this time. Where the evaluation identifies changes needed in the job description, the committee
 will work with the supervising staff member to complete those.
- Compensation the committee closely reviewed the UUA salary recommendations and set out our priorities for this year (in this order): ensure equity between positions of a similar level of responsibility (especially gender equity), get closer to a living wage to all staff, and get closer to having all staff paid at or above the UUA minimum for their role and experience. The committee worked with the Finance Committee, Treasurer, Lead Minister and Board of Trustees to set out our priorities and to make more specific recommendations once the pledge drive was completed.
- Hiring and staff changes no actions this term, but when needed the committee is available to assist with job postings, interviews and hiring in conjunction with the supervising staff member.
- Lead Minister the committee and the Chair have met several times with Rev. Tim Temerson. We continue to work closely with him, to support the smooth functioning of the congregational staff.
- Benefits Sean manages benefits for staff, but the committee helped review projected benefits numbers for next year's budget.
- Committee members the committee is full currently (4-5 elected members per the Bylaws), and no new members are needed this summer. We are working with the Nominating Committee to determine whether the current terms are appropriately staggered, to ensure smooth continuity each church year.
